Demand Indicator

The Demand Indicator remains at Cautionary. The number of New and Replacement Positions in the State and County decreased slightly. The number of Program Majors decreased by about 20%. Factors such as the lower enrollment numbers for the College and a 2.4% unemployment rate contribute to the decline in program majors. According to the 2017-18 numbers, the HOST Program has one of the larger program sizes, which places it in the top five CTE programs. Increases were evident in Fall Full-Time, Spring Part-Time, SSH in Program Classes, FTE Enrollment, and Total Number of Classes Taught. The increase in classes taught may be attributed to Early College classes; however, these numbers do negatively affect Persistence and Certificates and Degrees Awarded. Efforts continue to market the program to Early College schools, industry partners, and the community at large.

Efficiency Indicator

The efficiency indicator moved from Healthy to Cautionary. The Average Class Size dropped slightly, as did the Fill Rate. Additionally, the Number of Low-Enrolled Classes increased;

however, two of the classes are Cooperative Education (Internship) which typically have less than five students every semester. Typically, the faculty TEs are at .20 per student. Overall, the low enrolled classes brought down the Average Class Size from 18 to 15.

Effectiveness Indictor

The Effectiveness Indicator moved from Healthy to Cautionary. The number of Withdrawals decreased by 50%. Persistence Rates from Fall to Spring and Fall to Fall all dropped slightly; however, Fall to Spring at 73% and Fall to Fall at 49% rates are quite good and better than most. Overall, the number of Degrees Awarded remained flat while Certificates awarded dropped slightly. Transfers to UH 4-year are expected to remain flat as more students are counseled to pursue an AA and then transfer to career-focused degrees. The Exploratory Majors in Business pathway is expected to further decrease the transfer numbers in CTE programs. I also question the measurement and/or validity of the data. I am aware of one HOST major that transferred to UHWO last year, but that is not reflected in the data. Additional date acquired through our Institutional Researcher shows that over the past 10 years, 11 students transferred to another 2-year college, 6 to a 4-year, and 8 transferred to a college outside of the UH system.

Distance Education

The number of DE HOST courses will most likely be limited to one per year, unless demand increases. The Enrollment and Fill Rate dropped slightly, as expected. The solo class had an enrollment of 22 students, which was down 2 students from the previous year. These small changes can negatively affect the overall percentages year over year. Successful Completions were up slightly, as was Persistence. Persistence rates from Fall to Spring were at 68%. These two areas did show a positive improvement over last year, and could be partially due to the use of a different lecturer.

Perkins IV Core Indicators 2016-17

The HOST Program met the Technical Skills Attainment, but did not meet the other indicators. In order to meet the Perkins Indicators, I believe there must be better coordination and accountability across the board, not just by Program Coordinators.

Performance Measures

The number of Degrees and Certificates for students, including Native Hawaiian showed slight decreases. Beginning fall 2018, the HOST program expects to have five Kauai High School students complete one of the program certificates by spring 2019. If this is successful, the program plans to continue to work towards promoting more certificate completions in Early College. Waimea High School is interested in working on certificate completers. HOST 100 will be offered in spring 2019, which will work towards this goal. The number of transfers remained unchanged, and is expected to remain flat due to the Exploratory Majors in Business and/or counseling of students to pursue AA degrees and then transfer to 4-year TIM programs.

Over the past three years, the trends are somewhat predictable given the dropping enrollment at the College and the stronger economy.
