1. Program or Unit Description

The HOST program provides students a quality education, and prepares them for a career in the Visitor Industry or for transfer to a bachelor's degree in Business and/or Travel Industry Management. The HOST program promotes positive work ethics, self-esteem, service excellence, customer-centric attitudes, cultural understanding and appreciation, quality and productivity, positive interpersonal skills, professionalism; and supports students in achieving their goals. The programs' tagline is "Ensuring the sustainability of Aloha in the Hospitality and Tourism Industries".

The target student or service population is any high school graduate, KCC student, Visitor industry employee, or anyone seeking a job in a Visitor-related industry field. This may include students interested in activity-based companies, entertainment, media services, the restaurant industry, or small business owners. Since the Visitor industry is our islands' largest economic driver, almost all businesses are connected directly to visitors or employees of the visitor industry.

DEMAND:

The Demand Indicator is Healthy again, same as last year. The number of New and Replacement Positions in the State and County (combined) remain fairly stable at 355 (355 in 2018-19; 351 in 2017-18). The number of Program Majors was 38 in 2017-18, 36 for 2018-19, and up to 40 in 201920, an increase of about 10%. In terms of number of majors, the HOST Program is in the top four out of 13 CTE programs at KauCC.

Increases were evident in the number of Native Hawaiian majors, Fall full-time and Spring Full Time. Fall and Spring part-time numbers were lower, which is odd as most students typically are part-time, and the CoVid19 pandemic would not have affected the numbers that greatly till the middle of the semester.

Decreases are evident in SSH non-majors in Program Classes, FTE Enrollment, and the Total Number of Classes Taught. The decrease in classes taught were due to low-enrollment

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cancellations, and some of these impacts may be due to the number of Early College classes that are offered in the high schools. The program offered a total of fifteen (15) HOST courses in 2019-2020, a slight drop from the year before. Five out of the 15 courses were offered as Early College at Kauai HS (3-HOST 100; 2 HOST 101). An additional HOST 100 course will be offered at Waimea High School in Spring 2021. HOST 100 is one of the most frequently offered classes in Early College, and this provides a potential pathway for students to continue in the HOST program at KCC.

The HOST Program will continue to adjust its course offerings as we navigate the impact of the pandemic on enrollment numbers and short-term employment opportunities. Typically, when unemployment numbers rise, we see an increase in enrollment; however, it is difficult to predict the long-term impact on the economy, and how this may affect enrollments in the program over the next couple of years. Based on past economic downturns, the Visitor industry was the first to jumpstart the economy, so predictably, this will continue in the short-term economic landscape.

EFFICIENCY:

The Efficiency indicator remains at Cautionary. The Average Class Size remained the same as the previous two academic years, although the fill rate increased by about 3%. Additionally, the Number of Low-Enrolled Classes decreased from 4 to 3, and has decreased over the past two academic years, which is a positive sign. One issue is that our HOST 293 Cooperative Education (Internship) is factored into the equation, and these classes typically have less than five students every semester. Faculty TEs are based at .20 per student; however, it can still be factored in as low enrolled.

EFFECTIVENESS:

The Effectiveness Indicator is Cautionary this year. However, the percentage of Successful Completions remained stable at 78%. The number of Withdrawals decreased from 8 to 7. The Persistence Rates dropped after a high in 2018-19; however, the Persistence numbers are still quite good compared to other CTE programs.

The HOST program continues to award a number of degrees and certificates at a fairly stable rate. A Program Action Request, effective Fall 2020, increased the numbers of Certificates of Achievement from one to two, which should provide an increase in the Effectiveness numbers going forward. The increase in Certificates of Achievement should be realized on the next Annual Report of Program Data (ARPD). Transfers to UH 4-year numbers are low, but as a CTE program, they are within an acceptable range.

DISTANCE INDICATORS

The number of DE HOST courses offered annually remain at one fall course, although the HOST Program is now Distance Certified. While the Enrollment and Fill Rate numbers have dropped, the Successful Completion numbers have significantly increased. The number of Withdrawals also declined. The HOST program will consider another DE course offering in Fall 2021 due to an interest from Hawaii CC in the HOST 100 and 101 courses. Discussions are in progress to provide

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HawaiiCC students with the ability to earn a certificate and work towards a degree as there is currently no full-time faculty in the Hawaii CC program.
